Restoring Civil Liberties

While some in Congress desperately want to continue the NSA's domestic spying, I vigorously defended the Fourth Amendment by voting to limit the NSA's ability to use taxpayer money to spy on its own citizens. Not only is it important Congress empower the federal government to fulfill one of its primary responsibilities – providing for the national defense – but we must do so with respect for the Constitution.

That is why I voted in favor of an amendment, introduced by Reps. Justin Amash (MI-03) and John Conyers (MI-13), to the Department of Defense Appropriations Act of 2014 (H.R. 2397) that would restore civil liberties and uphold the Constitution. The Amash-Conyers Amendment, ultimately, failed to pass the House by a vote of 205-217. We must remain eternally vigilant in our defense of liberty and I intend to continue doing so. Real Economic Growth

Keeping Electricity Affordable

As an original co-sponsor of the Coal Residuals Reuse and Management Act, I was proud to see it pass with strong bipartisan support in the House of Representatives this week. By scrapping some harmful and costly EPA mandates and returning the permitting process for coal ash to the states, we can keep electricity affordable.

All-of-the-Above Energy

I had a great visit to the Copper Crossing Solar Ranch, which overlooks 144 acres of solar panels in Florence and powers more than 3,400 homes. I will continue to support an all-of-the-above energy policy, which includes important facilities such as this one.

Planning for American Energy Act of 2013

I am a proud co-sponsor of the Planning for American Energy Act of 2013, which requires the Secretary of the Interior to establish goals for all-of-the-above energy production on all federal lands managed by the Department of the Interior and the Forest Service. If we truly want to pursue an all-of-the-above national energy strategy, we must develop all energy sources on all possible lands, including publicly-held lands.

Let the Public Have A Say

We live in a democratic society where the president shouldn't have the ability to unilaterally designate monuments. I co-sponsored the Ensuring Public Involvement in the Creation of National Monuments Act because I want to ensure a transparent, collaborative process for national monument designations. I wrote about this before in <u>The Arizona Republic</u>.

Keeping Promises

I believe that when a promise is made, it should be kept. That is why I urged swift passage of the Keep the Promise Act of 2013 (H.R. 1410), which prohibits gaming activities on certain Indian lands in Arizona until the expiration of Proposition 202; the state's voter-approved gaming compact.

Should the agreement Arizona voters made with Indian tribes be broken, we would set a dangerous precedent. I applaud the House Natural Resources Committee for making the right decision this week to pass this legislation.
